After the establishment of ADRC, we have enthusiastically pursued activities with the support of member countries, advisory countries, the Japanese government, Hyogo prefecture and many other organizations. These activities include providing disaster reduction information over the internet, welcoming visiting researchers from member countries, conducting disaster management education and training, and promoting cooperative disaster reduction projects with member countries.

ADRC has also been working closely with the United Nations and particularly with the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in Kobe with whom we are promoting a number of joint projects. One such project was to open a Kobe office of their Relief Web in August 2001, which strengthened both their and our ability to provide disaster reduction information to the world.
