❑ **International Urban Search and Rescue Training**



SCDF, or Singapore Civil Defense Force, of Singapore Government launched a training course for around 20 personnel in charge of search and rescue (SAR) activities mainly from developing countries 2 years ago. SCDF has promoted international contribution for disaster reduction. ADRC, for the first time, cooperated with SCDF this year and invited participants

from ADRC's member countries to this course. Thus, ADRC dispatched three personnel from Philippines, Myanmar and Korea.

Singapore Civil Defense Academy, the training facility of SCDF, furnishes several facilities, such as a building with lecture and practice rooms, a fire simulation facility with 10-storied building, a confined space and debris space. Restaurant and lodging are also provided.

The training duration was around 2 weeks (from October 8th to 20th). While lectures were mainly held in the first week, practical drills were done in the second week. As the final part of the training, SAR simulation activities were held by making use of ruined facilities until the midnight.

Foreign trainees consisted of soldiers, fighter fighters and police officers, depending on their countries. All of them were impressed with technical skills as well as excellent facilities by SCDF. The training has ended in great success with their resolution to apply this outcome to their own SAR activities.

While it is said that Singapore is a safe country, they are always conscious of crisis management prepared for disasters, just in case. Singapore is enthusiastic about sharing such preparedness activities with foreign countries. In this regard, SCDF will organize "FIRE SAFETY & RESCUE ASIA CONFERENCE 2001", which will be organized by National Fire Prevention Council and Conference & Exhibition Management Services Pte Ltd of Singapore, from November 21st to 23rd. ➤ **Recent Natural Disaster in Asia**

❑ **Earthquake in Yunnan province, southwest China**

The earthquake, measuring 6.0 on the Richter scale, struck a remote area in southwest China's Yunnan province on October 27, 2001. State media reported that three persons were killed, at least 130 people were injured, and more than 200,000 people were affected in the earthquake.

Yongsheng County, the most affected area, is a sparsely populated region that abuts the Tibetan plateau and has been the scene of a series of quakes in recent years. It lies some 300 kilometers (190 miles) northwest of the provincial capital of Kunming.
