> JUSTSAP 2001 Workshop in Hawaii

From November 13 to 17, 2001, the 10th annual workshop of Japan US Science, Technology, and Space Application Program(JUSTSAP) were held in Hawaii, U.S.A. Dr. Yujiro Ogawa and Mr. Masaru Arakida attended the meeting as representatives of ADRC.

They attended subcommittee of DM3 (Disaster Monitoring, Management & Mitigation). They had very active discussion about effective use of Satellite Information and Information Sharing for disaster management through Internet.

Mr. Arakida made a presentation about Unique Disaster ID project which has been promoted with collaboration of CRED, Louvain Catholic University and UN-OCHA Relief Web. Dr. Ogawa introduced the development of Internet based GIS "VENTEN". They lively exchange of views on Information Sharing among the disaster management related organizations, and possibilities of the collaboration between PDC (Pacific Disaster Center) and ADRC.

Report from ADRC Counterpart

"Memorable Experience"

This is my own interesting memorable experience during my Disaster Prevention Training Course, which is held by JICA in 1999, in Japan

One day, our coordinator Mr. Sakai took all trainees of above training course to Hyogo prefecture. Before entering a room, each of us was given a card of visiting card size. When we sat around the table, and were waiting for some programme to be launched, a powerful earthquake stroke. Although we got various confused, we manage to escape the quake in a half conscious state.

When we come outside the room and the quake was over. We were a little bit satisfied of escaping unharmed from the earthquake in a country, which is also known as a country of many earthquakes. We were told to insert the cards given to us before we entered the room to computor. When it came out, what a surprise! The earthquake was a practical test of our training. It was printed in the card that the artificial quake measures 6.5 on Richter scale. There had been evaluation result in the card of the action performed by use to escape from the earthquake. Thank God! I had got a score of 410 out of 500.It was a lesson for us how can we escape during earthquake period.

From the event I come to realize that actions performed with sound presence of mind is far more important than lengthy theoretical knowledge. Thus I believe, action based training will be beneficial for disaster management.

Recent Natural Disasters in Asia Typhoon "KAJIKI" Hit Philippine and Vietnam

On December 6, 2001, Typhoon KAJIKI hit central Philippine at maximum winds of 85 kilometers (53 miles) per hour. Two people were dead and more than 6,400 people were displaced by flashfloods or landslides triggered by typhoon through out the country.

After leaving heavy damage in Philippine, the typhoon steered it's course to Quang Ngai to Ninh Thuan, central Viet Nam. 163 fishermen, who were away at sea during the storm, had been missing.
