I have joined the Asian Disaster Reduction Center (ADRC) from Hyogo Prefectural Government this April. When I first became a Hyogo Prefectural government officer, I worked at the Toyooka public works office which is located in the northern part of Hyogo, and then I moved to the water quality division of the environment bureau. When the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake occurred, I was working for the International EMECS Center whose



main goal is to organize international conferences for the environmental management of enclosed coastal seas all over the world. Unfortunately, the earthquake destroyed the Center, and I spent the next few months devoting my time to reopening the Center and worked hard delivering various kinds of rescue goods such as medicine, food, etc. I had further problems during the time because my son suffered from pneumonia due to the fatigue of the evacuation. However, under such difficult circumstances, I have learned the most valuable thing, that is, the importance of cooperation and support for each other.

My assignment at ADRC will surely give me good opportunities to offer support to the people who helped us after the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake. Especially, I hope I can contribute to making a safer and more secure environment in Asia.

Recent Natural Disasters in Asia Landslides caused a heavy damage in PNG

The landslide in the early hours of Tuesday, 2 April in the Wantoat area of Markham District in Morobe Province, 79 km Northwest of Lae, killed 9 people and left 27 people missing. The number of people at the disaster area currently requiring assistance is 138 people.

Forest Fires destroyed virgin forests in Vietnam

A forest fire, that started on 23 March in the 8,000-hectare U Minh Thuong National Park in the southern province of Ca Mau, have destroyed over 4,000 hectares of virgin forest. This will affect the lives of thousands of poor families living in the area, and will also have significant ecological impacts, including loss of biodiversity and habitat to local species.
