ADRC Dispatched Research Team to Turkey

From June 16th to 25th, Executive Director Mr.Nishikawa and Dr. Kurita were invited by the Ministry of Interior of Turkey & JICA to participate in a research mission in Turkey. The mission objectives were:

- To review the roles of disaster-related Gov't offices and organizations
- (2) To identify outstanding issues concerning the disaster management system of Turkey
- (3) To make recommendation on development of a training course curriculum for vice-governors and district governors.

The mission visited Gov't the Ministries. the governorships, municipalities and universities as well as Red Crescent Society at Ankara. Istanbul. Izmir and Corum.



Several issues to be addressed became evident in the The role of the individual administrative offices are quite sectionalized both at national and local levels, and the disaster reduction cycle "Prevention/Mitigation, Preparedness, Response and Recovery/Reconstruction" is not quite linked in the Turkish system. Large mass of vulnerable buildings in Turkey may turn to one of major factors of numerous human losses in the future. Some local politicians have allowed illegal occupation of dangerous buildings.

Wrap-up meeting was held at Ankara at the end of the mission. Followed by a presentation on disaster

management system in Japan, Mr. Nishikawa reported observations the regarding **Turkey's** Earthquake Disaster Management System, recommended and Turkish government that they adapt the



TDRM approach in Turkey with focus on promoting reinforcement of buildings and public awareness programs & disaster education in schools. Nishikawa also emphasized the importance mobilizing senior Turkish administrators with long reduction/response experience in disaster dissemination of good practices at governorship or municipal levels. In view of "Disaster Management Activity based on Reliable Information", the workshop curriculum was focused on "Development & Usage of Hazard Maps" and "Disaster Assessment Methodologies". The participants counted more

than 60 officials from $1\overline{7}$ countries' government focal points, UN and International organizations. Vigorous discussions made at sessions (1) Best Practice of "Total Disaster Risk Management
