In 2011, we were faced once again with numerous natural disasters, starting with the Great East Japan Earthquake in March, followed by a tropical typhoon and flooding in Thailand and other Southeast Asian countries, an earthquake in Turkey, and other disaster events. Together these disasters



claimed a tremendous number of precious lives and destroyed people's valuable assets. It has been ten months since the Great East Japan Earthquake and subsequent tsunami devastated the Pacific coast of northeastern Japan.

This earthquake and tsunami caused unprecedented damage in our country. Recovery efforts in the affected area are going to take very long time. It is important for Japan to disseminate information to other disaster-prone countries regarding the lessons learned and the measures that should be taken in response to future natural disasters. I am committed to the goal of delivering high-quality technical services to member countries, thereby contributing to our common objectives: disaster risk reduction and sustainable development in Asia. I look forward to your ongoing support for these efforts.

Report from the Second Expert Group Meeting: Toward Creative Learning from the Mega-Tsunami Disaster

The Great East Japan Earthquake resulted in the largest number of casualties in Japan since the end of World War II. More than 120 countries and international organizations have extended their support to the affected areas, and recovery and reconstruction efforts are ongoing. The lessons learned from the Great East Japan Earthquake and subsequent policy developments should continue to be studied to enhance the disaster management capacities of disaster-prone countries and communities, and discussions around these topics should continue to be promoted by relevant organizations and countries.

ADRC held its second expert group meeting with the Japanese Cabinet Office, the UN Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP), the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), and the

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International Recovery Platform (IRP), in Tokyo on 16-17 December 2011, with the first meeting having been held last May. The meeting invited policy managers from Japan and other countries in the Asia Pacific region to discuss the lessons learned from the Great East Japan Earthquake and the major policy changes adopted since then. The meeting also provided opportunities to discuss the relevance of the Japanese experience in the international context and to obtain input and feedback from the experts of other countries. The thematic sessions following the plenary session focused their discussions on the lessons learned from the Great East Japan Earthquake from three perspectives: 1) early warning systems and public awareness and education, 2) resilience of critical infrastructures and society and 3) organizing response and recovery. Many issues were discussed during the thematic sessions, including how public awareness and education activities complement structural measures, the importance of multi-functionality and redundancy of

infrastructure including ICT, and the issue of bridging the gaps in response and recovery by utilizing tools/mechanisms and emerging principles.

The meeting was attended by 112 participants, representing national governments, mostly from the Asia Pacific region, international organizations, Japanese government and aid agencies, NGOs, and research institutions.
