Workshop on the Role of Broadcaster held in Bangkok on 13-16 June

After the Indian Ocean Tsunami occurred in late 2004, we have the growing recognition of the necessity to the Tsunami Early Warning System. As one of indispensable element of the Tsunami Early Warning System, Broadcasters have been playing a vital role in the disaster reduction.

Based on this concept, **UN/ISDR** Asia-Pacific Broadcasting Union (ABU) organized two media workshops on the role of broadcasters in Bangkok, Thailand on 13-16 June 2005, gathering many broadcasters from the Indian Ocean Tsunami affected countries. Mr. Masayuki Kitamoto, **Executive Director of the Asian Disaster Reduction** Center (ADRC) was invited as a lecturer.

The first workshop focused on the Emergency Information Flow while the second one focused on the Public Awareness, Preparedness and Response.

At the workshop in the first two days, Mr. Kitamoto made a presentation regarding the Total Disaster Risk Management (TDRM) and the role and activities of broadcasters in Japan. Consecutively, Mr. Tomio Kojima, Executive Director of Disaster and Safety Information Centre, Japan Broadcasting

Corporation (NHK), showed a video of the news studio in the event of an actual earthquake. In his presentation, Mr. Kojima also stressed the importance Λf coordination with organization



involved in the disaster related information, and preparedness for broadcasting accurate information calmly and promptly in an emergency.

In the latter part of the workshop, Mr. Kitamoto emphasized the importance of continuous broadcasting on accurate knowledge about disasters, evacuation methods and so on.

Throughout the workshop, the participants deepened their understanding of broadcasters' role in disaster reduction, but there will also be need to holding for in-country seminars as a follow-up step.

Recent Natural Disasters in Asia:

Floods in India

West India's Gujarat State is suffering from heavy rain as the death toll in the flood rose to 132 at least. 400,000 people were made homeless as of 4 July, 2005. Three districts in central Gujarat were surrounded by 2 to 3 meters deep rainwater, while power supply was affected in 4,500 villages in the whole state.
