Asian Conference on Disaster Reduction 2021 (ACDR2021)

The basic theme of last year's Asian Conference on Disaster Reduction (ACDR) was "Can We Adapt to the New Normal?" This theme reflected the idea that developments like the climate crisis and COVID-19 are prompting us to adapt to new conditions by rethinking the wide range of activities that encompass our personal lives and economic activities. At the conference, many member countries and experts acknowledged the current state of the crisis and pointed out the need for change across a wide range of areas. "Crisis," "Adaptation," and "New Normal" were the key words of the last conference. It was suggested that we need to make significant changes to become a sustainable society that takes into consideration the needs of vulnerable groups. We need to abandon the old economic structures and build a new model based on sustainable development and social fairness.

At ACDR2021, we will further develop these ideas with a focus on disaster risk reduction (DRR) and will discuss what kind of world we want to live in and how to realize it. Based on the issues discussed at ACDR2020, we set the following basic theme for this year's event: "Time for Change and Transformation: The Road to a Resilient Asia." The ACDR2021 virtual conference will be held on 14-16 December 2021 using Zoom. The conference will allow participants to discuss the issues raised in the papers shared on the event website, which will be launched in October. The tentative agenda of ACDR2021 is shown below:

The ACDR2021 sessions will focus on the following themes:

-Session 1: "Developing DRR Technologies that Meet Local Needs to Create a Safe, Secure, and Livable Society"

Session 1 is aimed at supporting member countries in implementing the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR) and the SDGs, and contributing to the creation of a safe, secure, and livable society with the latest DRR technologies.

-Session 2: "Strengthening Disaster Preparedness: Education and Awareness Raising for Promoting Proactive Disaster Risk Reduction Actions"

Session 2 is aimed at seeking effective methodologies for DRR education and public outreach to promote and encourage actions that people can take proactively before and during disasters, including the transmission of lessons learned from past disasters.

Session 3 is aimed at sharing recent knowledge, perspectives, and approaches to accelerate risk-informed investment and provide an overview of practical methods of investment through organizing DRR strategies from a local perspective.

Sharing Asian Disaster Response Experiences with Africa

ADRC participated in a two-day "Regional Capacity Building and Experience Sharing Workshop on State Resilience to Shocks and Disasters" held 13-14 August 2021 in Freetown, Sierra Leone. The African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM) – in collaboration with the United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR), the World Health Organization (WHO), the European Commission (EC), African Risk Capacity (AFC), and the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) – organized this event under the auspices of the African Union. Most participants were high-level officials from the 40 APRM member countries.

The discussions held during the workshop focused on five themes: (1) Disaster Risk Knowledge; (2) Understanding Disaster Risk Governance, (3) Building Resilience in Health, Agriculture, Peace, and Security in Africa; (4) Multi-Hazard Early Warning Systems and

ADRC presented via Zoom, specially arranged by the APRM Secretariat. Other workshop participants gathered in person in Freetown, Sierra Leone.

Emergency Operations; and (5) Developing Integrated Disaster Risk Financing.

ADRC gave a presentation on theme (4), via Zoom, entitled, "Building the Case for Multi-Hazard DRM System Experiences in Asia during the COVID-19 Pandemic." The key messages of the presentation were as follows:

- In Asia, many disaster response mechanisms are based on a "single-hazard" approach to disaster response. Thus, when multiple disasters occur simultaneously, the response systems are overwhelmed.
- Responding to disasters during the COVID-19 pandemic has complicated disaster response efforts, especially in governments where disaster response and pandemic response are managed separately by different agencies.
- Evolving response practices (e.g., digitalization of early warnings, dispersed evacuations, and remote psychological first aid) are starting points for moving from a single-hazard disaster response approach to a multi-hazard disaster response approach.
